SCEA-N REPORT 2011 - 2014:

Since the foundation of SCEA Working Group on Northern Europe Countries (SCEA-N), initial updates on membership organisations and update on members have been established.

In this context, report has to highlight that countries in SCEA-N still own a difference how veterans' status is regarded and valued. Very recently, based on hard work and lobbying, many Nordic countries have officially recognized the status of veterans as it was never done before. This is partly because situation in international peacekeeping, crises management and peace enforcement has significantly changed during the past decade. National involvement in both UN as well as NATO engagements in the world, Afghanistan, Iraq and many other places have changed and become a part of everyday life. Recognition and status of individuals involved has become increasingly accepted.

To assist this reformation, Nordic cooperation including Board of Nordic Blue Berets initiatives as well as the outstanding lobbying support of SCEA chairman Dan-Viggo Bergtun.

This has resulted in serious change of national doctrine regarding education, training, deployment, redeployment and veteran support post deployment. Also the family status has carefully been considered and support for the ones left behind at home has been developed.

Obviously, peacekeeping and overseas deployments are nothing new for Nordic participation and it is clearly recognized as one of the main tasks of the relevant national defence structures. However, the amount of national sacrifice had rapidly increased during the past years, subsequently as the involvement in for example Afghanistan and Iraq have touched all with tragedy, either with loss of life or severe injury.

Mainly due to well functioning Nordic cooperation, involvement in for example WVF and copying the best results of each member country, the issue of veteran's recognition and veteran support overseas and at home have evolved quickly in most SCEA-N.

SCEA-N Nordic Veterans Policy 2011-2014

Since active participation in international WVF functions all Nordic national veterans' organisations primarily reflecting peacekeeping issues, former peacekeepers, crises management experts and other so called "active" combatants and veterans in service of international peace have developed rapidly towards a more common understanding of the veteran status and veterans' issues.

In the -90ies and even as far as to 2006-2008 – Nordic veteran status was predominantly reflected as Comrade Support for former peacekeepers’ as well as peacekeeping issues. Only recent years the focus has changed to a more internationally recognized veteran status.

In this respect – today only Finland have a legacy of WWII veterans status to respect more than perhaps the status of so called crises management veterans.

Norway

Since the last report, Norwegian action plan “In Service for Norway is ongoing and advancing according to plan. The Norwegian Defence curriculum within the program has nearly been completed.

The Action Plan was produced through an interdisciplinary collaboration between the ministries involved: the Ministry of Defence (MOD), the Ministry of Justice and the Police (MOJ), the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (MFA), the Ministry of Health and Care Services (MHCS), the Ministry of Labour (ML) and the Ministry of Children, Equality and Social Inclusion (MCESI), and partly through a collaboration between the MOD, the Norwegian Armed Forces, and veterans and employee organisations.

Denmark

Since the last reporting, Denmark has established and continuously defined veteran status and increased their rehabilitation network. The steps have nevertheless been designed and formulated mainly based on Danish Armed Forces initiative. The formerly principal role of WVF member and partner The Danish Blue Berets have seemingly been sidestepped in favour of Danish reservists organisations.

Denmark has established Forsvarets Veterancenter HQ at Ringsted Kaserne (Regiment) but is available at various locations around Denmark.

Danish National Flagday has been celebrated 5th September with Parade and honours.

Veterans' recognition has since 2011 been established by a Veterans ID, which enables owner of this card selected privileges. Most responsibilities for executing veterans' policy in Denmark involve Ministry of Defence.

Since 1948 approximately 100.000 men and women have been deployed in international peace efforts and humanitarian relief work. The most recent deployments to Afghanistan and Iraq have been categorized as direct combat missions. Since early deployments in 1956 to date more than 110 Danish serving for peace have lost their life, almost half of them in Denmark's most recent ISAF engagement alone.

The Blue Berets have 2012 introduced a national medal of recognition in Gold, Silver and Bronze. First medals were awarded on 5th September 2012.

Swedish veteran legislation has been established

Sweden has quite recently developed Parliament initiatives from 2007 SOU 2007:77 En svensk veteranpolitik, del 1 and SOU 2008:91 En svensk veteranpolitik, del 2 Swedish Veteran Policy part 1 and part 2 as well as Dir 2007:83 dealing with the governmental responsibility of personnel before, during and post international military engagements.

The Swedish Armed Forces (Försvarsmakten) have been given an indefinite responsibility to care for former soldiers and announced the establishment of a new veteran soldier unit to attend to their needs. A new unit has been established at the Armed Forces' headquarters with personal contacts are allocated to individual veterans and their relatives. The government has also decided that injured soldiers will now be offered support for as long as they need it, removing the earlier five year limit. Furthermore soldiers will be offered help in contact with social services and municipalities to enable reintegration into society after completion of service.

Recognition has been established for Swedish veterans as a memorial has been commissioned and a remembrance day on 29th May has been established for all of Sweden's veterans, in this case personnel that have participated in Swedish military components overseas. .

Sweden has been involved in military operations overseas since 1948. A total of 81 Swedes have lost their lives, with 16 dying in combat. Among the operations with Swedish troop deployment are named Korea, Kosovo, the Gulf of Aden (Somalia) and Afghanistan, where the country keeps a force of 500 troops. Sweden has totally deployed

over 101.000 times in international service including police, civilians and international monitors, usually lasting 6 month at any time.

The Government wish to increase indefinitely the support that soldier get when returning injured from overseas deployments. This would also regard psychological trauma. As Swedish deployment has been increasing for many years in Afghanistan until today, it has become more usual to find returnees with physical injuries. Many injured have faced challenge when dealing with rehabilitation authorities as activities have not been coordinated. In the proposition of a law on veterans issues responsibility for coordination will be placed on Swedish Defence Forces as a one door policy.

Swedish Defence forces have in 2012 placed the veteran and their families in focus. Emphasis will be on preventive support. Defence have established a broad network of veterans' issues experts decentralized and available at all 35 units.

Swedish Defence Forces Veteran Department is direct chain of command under Defence Commander in Chief. It is responsible to coordinate and support veterans, unit commanders and ideological organisations. The department gives direction to Defence support to veterans family and close relatives. Direct support to veterans is ensured as local and regional unit commanders are tasked and have recourses to give support, advice and direction when required. Each unit has established a veteran coordinator as well as a point of contact for veterans and veterans' organisations

Veterans are recognized by the annual Veterans' Day 29th May. A Veterans' monument will be unveiled in Stockholm. In addition to the International Services medal a new medal for wounded in action has been established.

Finland still put emphasis on the Finnish Wars Veterans.

In comparison to the other Nordic countries situation in Finland is not exactly similar. Traditionally veterans' status has been privileged to Finland honorary citizens, men and women who participated in the Finnish Wars (1939 – 1944) during WW II.

Honorary citizens are protected and supported by several laws. Today there are still about 40.000 war veterans alive and are expected to be around at least until 2025. Not all of these are registered as war of front veterans or war invalids. Four organisations, some of them established in the mid sixties are still representing Finnish war veterans and invalids. These are listed in the annex and all collectively members of the Finnish delegation to WVF. In 2010, the fifth organisation, Peacekeepers' Association Finland was approved member of WVF.

Among war veterans' support are periodic rehabilitation schemes based on health, age and injury. All veterans are officially privileged and most veterans are registered in one

or many of the four veterans' organisations. Registration includes veteran ID that includes many practical benefits and support.

For the moment there are 32 war veteran rehabilitation centres still operating. Obviously cliental is decreasing rapidly but also the ones in need of care require more rehabilitation balancing up. Unfortunately the legislation and invalidity recognition does not include psychological injury.

Since 2011 some discussions have indicated that perhaps one or two of these rehabilitation centres would enable peacekeeper veterans to participate in rehabilitation. In the future these could also include rehabilitation of other than Finnish clients. Negotiation for a so called test group of severely and lightly physically has been initiated.

Involvement in Nordic Defence Cooperation (NORDEF) sector on veterans' issues has instigated the formulation of a strategy for current and former peacekeepers and crises management personnel. There are issues to resolve, however defence authorities are catching up rapidly.

Peacekeepers' Association Finland (PKAF) has an integral role in supporting and co-formulating some of the issues to be addressed in a future policy for former peacekeepers. Finnish Defence Forces have offered PKAF a seat in the NORDEF group of experts on veterans' issues.

National Crises Management Veteran Program

In May 2013 a formal kick-off was made for development and execution of a Finnish National Crises Management Program. This has been initiated by Minister of Defence Mr Carl Haglund, who has been very proactive on the issue of veterans' affairs for our former peacekeepers and crises management experts' wellbeing. Likewise Minister of Health and Social Welfare Mrs Paula Risikko has been supportive and integrated the legislation aspect of this program.

By 2016 a new veteran's legislation, including the Act on Military Injury will be implemented. In this legislation, special status will be given to crises management issues.

Nordic Peacekeeper Veterans cooperation - BNBB

Within the SCEA-N inter-Nordic cooperation has continued as usual. In August 2011, an annual meeting of Board of Nordic Blue Berets took place in Stockholm archipelago. As usual, a well established tradition to simultaneously concentrate efforts on Veteran Support held a two day conference at the same venue. This meeting presented the current developments of each countries engagement in veteran support issues.

In August 2012, Board of Nordic Blue Berets and Nordic Veteran Support Group met in Baereia Norwegian Armed Forces Veteran Centre in Kongsvinger.

In August 2013, Board of Nordic Blue Berets and Nordic Veteran Support Group met in Frönslev, Denmark.

In August 2014, Board of Nordic Blue Berets and Nordic Veteran Support Group will meet in Tuusula, Finland

Norway - NVIO

The Norwegian Veterans Association for International Operations (NVIO) is a non-political and volunteer organisation for military personnel having participated in international operations, their dependents, and others who support NVIO's work. NVIO is Norway's largest organisation for veterans from international operations, with approx. 8000 members, and 53 local clubs all over Norway (as of April 2009). NVIO is engaged in extensive, voluntary, preventive work among veterans with problems. In addition to organising meetings for the members, and being a professional organisation for all veterans from operations abroad, and their dependents, working to improve rules and regulations pertaining to veterans affairs.

Experiences and memories from the military service is an important basis for the rest of the life for many veterans, and it becomes important to share these with other veterans. NVIO's local clubs make this possible by organising meetings and other activities. On behalf of The Armed Forces Veterans Administration, many of NVIO's local clubs conduct monthly veterans' gatherings for all veterans, independent of membership, serving pizza or another simple meal.

Emphasis on comrade support and further more on family support. NVIO is striving to ensure that the veterans, also afterwards, always should have a supporting shoulder within reach. Even though the vast majority do well after serving abroad, some veterans have to struggle with physical problems and psychological reactions as a result of their service. Nobody can determine in advance who will be stricken, how and to what degree. NVIO has established dedicated services to assist all veterans - independent of membership.

Denmark – De Blå Baretter

Denmark – De Blå Baretter have likewise during the reporting period emphasised the veteran status in their policy and statutes. Like Sweden, De Blå Baretter have inserted an annex to the name – organisation for veterans in international operations (translation)

De Blå Baretter – Danish International Veterans Organisation was founded in 1968. 3000 members are established in 17 branch associations. They also represent the Danish voice in WVF. Denmark's most predominant veteran organisation has during the years developed veteran support activities "Kammerat-støtte".

Finland - PKAF

From 2012 Peacekeepers' Association Finland changed President. Heikki Holma who was leading activity for the past five years stepped down and Paavo Kiljunen took his place. (New contacts in list attached).

Since fall 2011 the association had formed a renewed strategy and subsequently Association rules were revised and passed.

Organized activity on behalf of blue berets, peacekeepers and crises management troops and individuals has been founded in 1969. PKAF has today more than 7000 members and is formed by 32 member associations. On the agenda PKAF has been established supporting peacekeepers and former peacekeepers.

Among other issues, effort has been delivered to both supporting with whatever limited means possible our national honorary citizens, World War II and veterans of our wars.

Among activities:

- supporting veterans and or veterans widows where requested – cleaning, chopping wood, gardening, social listening
- supporting and assisting during Veterans Associations meetings
- participating and honouring during dates of significance – honour guard
- participating in Veterans Association meetings, conferences and seminars
- supporting our wars veterans with transportation to assorted veterans venues

PKAF Finland employed first Veterans Issues staff

Since 2013 PKAF has employed first expert. With financial support of RAY Raha-automaattiyhdistys – Finnish Slot Machine Association – an expert on veteran support issues plan and execute a veteran's support program to be established based on regional voluntary work throughout the country. This person will serve a 4 year program. Hopefully by that time PKAF will have the means to employ a continuing professional to administrate the ever growing organisation.

Sweden – Sveriges Veteranförbund – Fredsbaskrarna (SVF)

Fredsbaskararna Sverige have changed their organisational status and structure, including namn during the reporting period. In 2013 Fredsbaskrarna Sverige changed to Sveriges Veteranförbud Fredsbaskrarna. This is deemed more appropriate and in line with the Swedish Veteran Policy.

Predecessor Fredsbaskrarna Sverige – Swedish Peace Berets (FBS) was established to preserve and develop the comradeship that has been formed in service as a peace soldier in UN or UN sanctioned deployments. Organized activity under has been registered since early 1970:ies.

This includes promotion of comrade support among members, in accordance with signed agreements with the Armed Forces train and operate a socially supportive activities and also support those who are not members and do not fit under the action of the organisation, take initiatives and support links with other national associations and organizations and internationally with organisations sharing the same objectives, to care for UN's traditions and goals and to provide a space for peace initiative through fellowship.

Other SCEA-N member states and member organisation

As listed before, other WVF member states Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania have registered veterans' organisations.

So far, using email and traditional mail as well as available phone numbers, unfortunately no contact has been made.

Bilateral contact between some of the local branch association within PKAF and Estonian reserve organisations has been made during the past two years. However these are not exclusively veterans associations.

A tradition initiated in the mid nineties, maintain contact during annual ERNA Raid and UTRIA Raid military skill and endurance competitions.
